Also, if you missed the September meeting we discussed the club's history, the library, how to sign up for fly flingers, an update on the Weiser Community Pond, election of officers, and most importantly, club members' shared special fishing memories and trips from this past summer.

Mann Creek reservoir the water is very low at 7% of capacity, but the trout are biting and nice fish up to 18" are being caught. However, according to ole **Mike Thomas** he tried to take two "future" fly fishermen to Mann Creek, but with the water being so low and so much mud to wade through to get to the water, he bagged it.

I also hear **Al Silonis** has been catching 15-20 fish a trip to Pole Creek reservoir near Vale and he is catching bass and some steelhead too below Hells Canyon dam. Please be aware that Idaho Power will be closing down the road across Hells Canyon dam on October 8th for repairs.

The Owhyee River water flow is running about 100 cfs and is fishing like "normal" for this time of the year with lots of fishermen from all over, but when you do find a location to fish you get the opportunity to catch some large browns.

Finally, IDFG is set to stock Mann Creek reservoir and the Weiser and Payette Ponds the week of October 15.

Once again, I "thank you" for the opportunity to be the President of the club and I look forward to a very successful year, and let's hope for some rain and a large snow pack for the mountains to help our fish in 2013.

Treasurer, **Jim Gulu**, reported that the pond checking account contains \$1,990.70 and that the club checking account contains \$3,505 as of October 2, 2012. Jim also presented our 2012-2013 Club Budget to the Board.

Perry Kelley volunteered to be the club's Media/Publicity person—so lookout newspapers.

Rod Jones reported that our Pond cleanup efforts on Friday, September 28 was very successful. The City will be using fish-safe chemicals in the Spring before the algae has a chance to surface.

Jim Gulu believes our club seems to be more of a "Service Organization" instead of a fly fishing club and that we should turn more of the pond maintenance over to the city as well as the "pond fund." Plecoptera are an order of insects, commonly known as stoneflies. There are some 3,500 described species worldwide, 11 with new species still being discovered. Stoneflies are found worldwide, except Antarctica. Stoneflies are believed to be one of the most primitive groups of Neoptera, with close relatives identified from the Carboniferous and Lower Permian geological periods, while true stoneflies are known from fossils only a bit younger. The modern diversity however apparently is of Mesozoic origin.







The nymphs are aquatic and live in the streams. A few species found in New

benthic zone of well-oxygenated lakes and Zealand and nearby islands have terrestrial nymphs, but even these inhabit only very moist environments. The nymphs physically resemble wingless

adults, but often have external gills, which may be present on almost any part of the body. In addition, they can also respire through the general body surface, and some even lack gills altogether. Most species are herbivorous as nymphs, feeding on submerged leaves and benthic algae, but many are hunters of other aquatic arthropods.[5]

The stonefly is a relatively large aquatic insect commonly found in cool, clean trout water throughout North America. Even though these bugs are less common than mayflies and caddis because of environmental factors, stoneflies can be quite important to trout and steelhead anglers in the western United States (especially in the Pacific Northwest) and they can make a well-prepared mid-western or eastern trout fly fisher's day during a prolific spring, summer, or fall hatch in ultra-clean and higher elevation lakes, rivers, and creeks.

Stonefly nymphs broadly resemble mayfly nymphs, but are generally a bit larger, have only two tails, and do not display visible gills along their abdomens. Stonefly nymphs can occur in a range of colors with blacks, browns, yellows, and rusty oranges being the most common. The stonefly nymph's set of six large, powerful legs allow it to hug its often rocky environment for up to three years before it finds itself ready to hatch to a winged adult.
