### **Confidence in Your Fly**

I just returned home from our yearly Steelhead fishing trip on the Grande Ronde River. Every year since 2006 Dave Henderson and I have made a trip to the Grande Ronde River in hopes of catching a few steelhead in one of the most beautiful settings in the Northwest. Some years are more fruitful than others, but the past two years have really tested our resolve. This year's trip started with great expectation, perfect weather, good river flows and suitable water temperatures. Our only questionable variable was fish numbers, running about 60% of the ten year average.

It never fails I always start to fish with the same fly every year, the Rock Creek, even though I spent half the year tying different patterns. For some reason my confidence level always seems to be much higher with this one tried-and-true pattern. This year was no exception. I fished the first evening with the Rock Creek and had absolutely no luck. Yes, I did pick up one nice trout but I was looking for a steelhead. Maybe it was due to the lack of success that first night or maybe I was just ready for a change. What ever it was, I tied on a new fly pattern, Steelhead Rubber Leg, and stuck with it until I caught my first fish. I fished it for two days with no luck but on the third day second cast I felt the tug of a good fish. Confidence is an interesting thing, after landing that first fish I knew I could trust that new fly pattern on future adventures. I look forward to giving it a try on the Snake River, we will see if my confidence lasts.

# 2013 Christmas List for Fly Fishermen

It's getting Christmas shopping time again and the same question each year: "What can I get for my fly-fishing spouse? He (she) has everything he (she) could possibly use." Not to worry; here are three options that are guaranteed not to be in your spouse's fly fishing arsenal. These items are found in the Christmas Catalogue from the Ephemeroptera Dynasty Company of Sand Hollow, Idaho. Each of these have a ephemeroptera life-time warranty according to Lew-Jim Goue, company CEO-BO.

## **Dome-top Match The Hatch Fly Box**

This unique fly slotted fly box has the capacity of approximately 250 flies. The lid has a hinged dome shaped appendage with a built in lighted 6x magnifier (bug stage). A 2.5 inch insect sample net with a 12 inch telescoping handle is attached to the bottom. These are the ingredients for, by far, the most sophisticated method for matching the hatch yet devised. When a hatch is happening and the fish are rising, it is time to take the appropriate action. Remove the sample net, extend the handle and catch one of those little hatching buggers. If they are out of reach, attach the sample net to the tip of your rod using the built-in pole clip. Open the hinged bug stage and place the hatching bugger on the stage section then check your fly box for a match. You may wish to place the fly on the stage with the bugger for size comparison. When you have a perfect match remove the fly and commence fishing. If you fail to get strikes, admit you have a lousy presentation and take up golf.

## Pneumatic Fine Tippet, Small Hook Fly Threader

One of the biggest frustrations that we chronologically challenged old fly fishermen (I'm three years younger than Perry Kelley) experience is how to thread a 7x tippet on a #24 midge in the dead of winter. After all for me, my work is completed by early morning Christmas Day and time to fly fish for the rest of the winter. The PFTSHFT (pfftshfft) is the ideal tool for this dilemma. All you do is place the tippet into the holding groove, then place the eye of the hook on the threading needle. Next press the firing trigger button and pffishfft air pressure forces the end of the tippet through the eye of the fly. Remove fly from the device, tie your favorite knot and you are ready to fish. The compressed air cylinder is good for about eight fly changes. You can recharge your PFTSHFT cylinder with an air compressor or



from your vehicle tire. Remove the valve cap from your tire and with the included inflation hose place one end on the PFTSHFT and the other on your tire valve stem. Warning: when you tire appears to be getting low sneak around the parking area and steal air from someone else's vehicle.

## **Mayfly Call**

Perhaps the most exciting and potential useful devise on the market for many years is the Mayfly Call. This amazing tool would not be possible if it weren't for the recent development in ultra high frequency science. There are two areas of studies: one is **Nano Ultra Stratospheric Hertz Technology** (NUSHT) and the other: **Nando Technology**. The first is the study of sound frequencies much higher than audible by humans, dogs and anything except Mayflies. The swarms are so elegant and artistic that you imagine Mozart, Mendelssohn and Tchaikovsky backgrounds of some of the world's most wonderful music enhancing these beautiful aerial ballets. Only for the Mayflies, it is the NUSHT sounds that turns them on.

Not only are the spinners in a frenzy but duns are beginning to pop up from the waters. They also want to enjoy the party. You make your first cast. You are immediately on to a great fish. The action will last most of the day. This will be fly fisherman's paradise and the road to it is the Mayfly Call.


In 1997, I was guiding a couple in Alaska. Larry was a skilled flycaster; Barbara had marginal experience but could make an adequate cast.
