President's Message by Ray Perkins

While getting gas last week just before I went up to fish on the Owyhee River I had a conversation with the attendant. He said was almost ready to start working in his shorts and tee-shirt. I pointed out to him it is still February. When I got to the Owyhee that day I was able to fish all afternoon in my tee-shirt. This all happened on Wednesday and by last Friday temperatures had dropped about 10°F and a nice light breeze picked up. We all must remember that the weather during this time of the year can dramatically change and we must be prepared.

During early February I made two trips up Owyhee River. On both trips I noticed large numbers of black midge shucks in the water. I even observed trout rising to take an adults seen floating on the surface. On the first fishing trip I tried a couple of midge patterns but had no luck with them. I did catch two fish on that trip. The belly of one of the trout was literally covered with small dark colored leeches. On the second trip I fished a small black and red leech pattern near the bottom and caught four trout, landing one brown and one rainbow trout. In March trout anglers on the Owyhee River need to remember that skwala stoneflies begin showing up in early March.

I dodged several large sleds boats going up to Owyhee Reservoir. Anglers going up on Owyhee at this time are probably searching for crappie and largemouth bass. Searching for bass and crappie in south aspect shorelines can be very productive.

Owyhee River Cleanup is scheduled for April 11, 2015. We will meet at BLM's Wildlife Viewing Area just inside the canyon at 9:00 am. We will provide coffee and donuts and give a short talk on safety and guidelines. Afterward the club will provide a barbecue lunch for club members.

At the last general meeting five people signed up for Rod Building class. The class will held in Weiser at the public library. Even though Marv Orwig is not around to lead the class this year a couple of experienced club members signed up for the class, we should be able to help the less experienced builders and complete the rods.

Some folks just fish and others "keep score" of their numbers or size of fish, others tie flies as well and make rods and travel to strange and wonderful places, and take photographs. Some enjoy the journey as much as the fishing and the fishing as much as the catching. Some even eat what they catch and delight in new ways to prepare and serve their prize catch. I guess we could add dine, dance and drink also. And don't forget meditate and commune with nature and the friends that came with you.

The game is whatever you want to make it. I have added keeping score of the species of fish I have caught, now standing at 49, and looking for several more when I go to Canada this summer.

Below is the list. It may add another dimension to your recreation. I have a friend who has caught 28 different species at Rocky Point Mexico in the Sea of Cortez - I have 15 there.

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"Charple" Flies

These amazing flies catch all kinds of trout - Cuttbows, Rainbows, Cutthroat, Rainbrowns, Brook and Bull; as well as largemouth and smallmouth Bass, Crappie, Bluegill, Carp, Perch, Shiners and even "yucky" Catfish and Suckers.



I usually tie this fly weighted with lead wire, but you can also tie it with a bead head with lead or not, or don't weight it at all. It will sink when it gets wet and it is a matter of how fast you need it to sink, given the water conditions, as to what kind and amount of weight to use.

- 1. Put the weight on the hook.
- 2. Tie a thread base starting at the eye and wrap to the bend of the hook and back to the midpoint of the hook.
- 3. Tie in a purPLE tail.
- 4. Tie in the CHARtreuse chenille at the tail and wrap forward to the eye of the hook.
- 5. Don't crowd the eye.
- 6. Tie off the chenille and whip finish the head. And I always whip finish the fly with red thread to identify that it has added weight (because Chris Burke does it that way).

Charple Fly

- **Hook**: TMC, Mustad, Diiachi, Fish Guy, Allen, or whatever you like
- **Size**: Any size depending on how big a fish you what to catch
- **Tail**: Anything purPLE that has a lot of movement in the water
- **Body**: CHARtreuse chenille
- **Thread**: Depends on the size of the fly! purPLE or CHARtreuse or white or red or whatever you might have
- **Hackle**: none Why do you want a fly with hackle? (ask a fly fisherman)



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Fly of the month The Super Bugger

When learning to tie flies, most of us made a woolly bugger of some sort. This is an improved model. Several things depart from the normal fly: Arctic fox tail, peacock body, bead, hot spot and hackle wound to the tail and back to the head make this pattern unique. Arctic fox tail has several desirable qualities that make it superior to marabou: it really has good motion in the water, it compresses at the tie-in spot, the colors are quite vivid and it expands in water. Peacock herl has more fish attraction qualities than chenille. Beads add weight and give the fly more motion in the water. Hot spot gives the fish a message to check out the fly.

The main difference is the way the hackle is applied. Start with a saddle hackle tied in from the butt right behind the bead. Make 2 touching wraps then palmer hackle to the end of the body

counting the wraps. Five to eight wraps is sufficient. Double the last wrap at the end of the body and make the same number of wraps forward. Make one more wrap at the start-in point and tie off hackle stem.

The advantage is the Super Bugger will not twist in the water, Your leader will not kink and you will be a much happier fisherman.

Super Bugger

• Hook: 3xl 10-4

• Thread: black 6-0

• **Tail**: Arctic fox tail

• **Body**: Peacock herl

• **Bead**: Your color choice

• **Hackle**: Saddle hackle(see directions)

• **Hot spot**: Hot orange or pink thread

• Weight: Lead or lead free wire 0.15


