Winter Fly Fishing

It's 20 degrees with 30 inches of snow on the ground and I'm getting ready to fish the Weiser River. Yup it does sound nuts but I shouldn't run into a crowds and the wildlife viewing will be great. Winter also offers the benefit of sleeping in and a full flask of an amber liquid guaranteed to warm you up. So if you are willing and your flask is full you may want to consider a few season specific tips before you head out:

- 1. Layering for warmth It's a good time to use those neoprene waders you gave up on many years ago. As long as there are no holes in the material they will provide good insolation on those cold days ahead. I try to stay away from cotton as much as possible preferring to use synthetic fleece or wool instead, its warmer even when wet. I tend to hit the thrift stores in the area when shopping for wool shirts and sweaters. They are much more economical and you are supporting a local business. Usually my head gear consists of a stocking hat over a baseball cap. I have even found wool baseball caps instead of cotton which is a big plus if you're in wet snow or rain. Pay particular attention to your gloves, I prefer wool but there are many dexterous synthetic gloves available at your local fly shop.
- Pick your Spot Identify fishing locations that are easy to access, snow and ice may limit many locations you normally frequent. Also, fish may be congregated in deep runs or tail water below a dam. Trout will often pod up in the deepest, slowest holes in a stream this time of year so let your fly dredge low and slow.
- 3. Nymphing time As they say "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens."

Winter is truly nymphing time for fly fishers and low and slow is the mantra. Strike indicators will greatly improve your success, many of the takes will be light, almost imperceptive even with a strike indicator. Keep fly and indicator size significantly smaller than you would in warmer months. Some possible go to flies include: pheasant tail, hare's ear, zebra midge, and San Juan worm. Remember the mantra low and slow so use weight to get the fly down.

4. No fear gear - Don't use your most expensive rod, reel and fly line. Ice in your guides and slippery footing may compromise your fly rod; ice may also scratch the coating on your line and freeze up your reel. This is a great time to break out that old fiberglass rod and Pflueger reel from the 60's as well as taking what's left of that old fly line used to wrap boxes and head to the river.

Now let's go have some fun!






The Mighty Colorado


The mighty Colorado River in Mexico is not more than a big canal, which is mostly used by Mexican farmers in the delta.
