President's Message

Here we are in February, the month of Valentine's Day(not much fishing there) and Presidents' birthday (could be if we celebrated Eisenhower and Carter). So is winter relegated to fly tying and telling fish stories? Oh, and I forgot, what about ice fishing? Even that is not a big thing on a mild winter. There is something, rumor tells me, that might be appropriate and interesting. Several of our members are catching trout in the Weiser pond and one in particular is having a ball using an old time-tested technique from ancient Japan, Tenkara.

Tenkara is both a technique and a special fly rod. The tenkara rod is made up of short lengths of about two feet of rod blanks that progressively get larger. The section of the largest diameter has a cork handle; the rest get progressively smaller and nest in each other. For transportation to the lake or stream, the rod is only about two feet in length. Like a telescope rod of our youth, the tenkara will telescope up to 10–15 feet in length. A short line is tied to the tip and a tippet is fastened to the line. A reel is not used. This is much like the old bamboo pole (a word not used in sophisticated fly fishing).

The advantage with tenkara is the fisherman has better control of the fly and the drift. It is much easier to avoid drag and to actually feel the

bite. Another advantage is the overall investment. You do not have to have a rod, reel, and fly line, just a rod and a line which is only a small fraction of the cost of a fly line and flies. Most tenkara anglers only carry a few flies, their rods which are telescoped down to two feet, their line and a tippet. Two feet is much better than a full extended fly rod catching on brush.

What are the disadvantages? Try to land a twenty inch rainbow on a rod without a reel. With few flies it is harder to match the hatch and carrying a long rod in brush can be challenging. Again, however, when you telescope it down it is a snap to carry.

Incidentally the correct pronouncement of tenkara is with a flipped "r". It is like the very beginning or a rolled "r".

Indianhead fly fisherman Mike Stanton is the proud owner of a new tenkara outfit and states that he is having a ball fishing with it and is catching fish in the pond.

Later on in this issue there is a list of the still waters in both Idaho and Oregon that was suggested at last membership meeting. I have caught fish in all but four of the lakes and ponds suggested. I would like to know how many of you have fished them all. I have listed the species of fish in each lake and also indicated the ones that have large fish. I consider an trout 18 inches large.

Fisherman's Attitude



When one carry's oars in the bed of their truck and fail to close tail gate, you might find yourself up a creek with half an oar!




