



Fly fishing is pecieved as the highest level skill in the pursuit of one of God's unique creatures.




Al and Jim Gulu went to Long Creek reservoir June 2. Jim caught 14 and Al

caught 15. Jim's biggest was 16 inches. Al's biggest was about 13 1/2 inches. The weather was great and they had a good day.





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


Billy's **Pond**

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Panko on the Weiser River Trail

June is always an interesting month in Cambridge: schools out, Hells Canyon Days, flows drop on the Weiser River and the bicycle migration starts. Over the past several years we have noticed a steady increase in the numbers of folks biking the Weiser River Trail and this year is no exception.

I had just finished using the weed-eater on the hill side reducing a potential fire hazard when I hear "how far to Cambridge?", looking up I see two guys on bikes both with little trailers. Now these guys weren't your normal trail rider, no color coordinated outfit with matching riders' helmet. No, these guys wore tattered Levis, Nikes and ball caps. Their bikes were a quality brand but beat to hell and both guys were, I guess about late 40s, yep a perfect age to do something stupid! So I thought I'd pass their story on to you.

It seems these two gentlemen (won't use their real names in case I see them again) are writing an article for a culinary magazine on eating well when biking. They had heard of the Weiser river trail at a bike shop in Boise and made plans for a five day ride from Weiser to Tamarack, about 82 miles. They were planning to catch fish and cook at each one of the planned overnight stops. They were hauling several different bottles of Idaho wine, freeze dried vegetables and a lot of Panko.

Apparently they made it to the canyon south of Midvale with time to spare so they spent quite a bit of time fishing. Not sure what to expect one of the gentlemen drifted nymphs the other was stripping streamers. They said in no time they both caught their limit in smallmouth bass and spent the rest of the afternoon filleting fish and drinking wine. After finishing the filleting they broke out the new two-burner propane stove, mixed up some freeze dried eggs, hydrated the freeze dried vegetables and started heating up the peanut oil in their new Primus stainless steel pot, yep they're still drinking wine bottle number two. They said they dipped the bass fillets and

vegetables in the egg batter then rolled in panko before placing in the hot oil. Since this is going in an article, photos were taken at each step in the preparation. Panko (パン粉) [says Wikipedia] is a variety of flaky bread crumb used in Japanese cuisine as a crunchy coating for fried foods, such as tonkatsu. Panko is made from bread baked by electrical current, which yields a bread without a crust, and




then grinding the bread to create fine slivers of crumb.[1] It has a crisper, airier texture than most types of breading found in Western cuisine and resists

absorbing oil or grease when fried, resulting in a lighter coating. Outside Japan, its use is becoming more popular in both Asian and non-Asian dishes: It is often used on seafood and is often available in Asian markets, speciality stores, and, increasingly, in many large supermarkets.


June 21, 2018

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
Monster Lurks in Weiser Pond



However, Wikipedia says that is Don Quixote's horse who is awkward, past his prime and engaged in a task beyond his capacities...that is me, not my spey rod.


First Fish at Billy's Pond

This is Bonnie's first Fish on a fly rod! A nice largemouth bass. Bonnie Akbar is one of our newest members.


She moved here from Reno and was accompanied by her dad-Dick Garrett. Dick also landed a huge (19" -3-4lb) largemouth bass.
