Fly of the month by Perry Kelley

Spruce Fly

Sometimes we are smothered by the number of fly patterns that are available.

How can you choose what to use. This becomes a point of frustration—on the stream do you try to match the hatch or do you go by your old standby pattern? It is confusing. Which fly to use? I have a pattern book that has hundreds of fly patterns from the flies that we used to use to the fly patterns of our times. How could you possibly make a choice which to use and which to tie?

Why not fish only with the flies that we used 30 years ago? They caught fish then, why not now? The Spruce Fly was my "go-to fly" for many years. Why? It caught fish! From the rivers to the lakes, it worked miracles. This is actually a streamer pattern. The secret is the badger hackle wings. The hackle is imported from China or India. It is somewhat hard to find this hackle but if you look hard, there are some fly shops or catalogs that still carry these. Although I have a Whiting badger neck, I always use the china neck for the wings.

Spruce flies (not like the spruce moth fly patterns) really do not imitate any

aquatic creature. They can possibly suggest minnows or just look like something for fish to eat. Whatever, they used to be a fantastic fly—why not now? They are easy to tie—try one.

Spruce Fly

Hook: 3xlong 6-14

Tail: Peacock sword fibers

Body: back 1/3 red floss, middle 1/3 peacock hurl, front 1/3 badger hackle, size for

hook size.

Wing: 2 matching badger hackles, one from the right side of the hackle the other from

the left side. Tie with the concave side facing outward. The wings will be

separated at the tips and touching at the tie-in point. Hackle: front 1/3 badger hackle



Incidentally, badger hackle feathers are white- to cream-colored with black or dark brown centers. The India-China badger hackles are quite different from the Whiting hackles. A size 16 India-China hackle feather would likely be about 3/4 inch long. Two turns would be as much as you could expect. The wings on the India-China hackles are usually the right size. On the other side, the Whiting hackles are too long and too thin to tie wings on a Spruce Fly.

One more comment: An India-China neck would cost under \$10, Whiting, \$50 up.
