They spent too much time apologizing and we agreed to help them on this event and they would help us with a fall cleanup for National Public Lands Day the 3rd week of September. Mark Sands sends this article he received from IDFG he thought is worth sharing.

A note, along with **an exciting video discovery**, from IDFG Retiree Jack Trueblood. Jack retired from IDFG in 2004 from his position of Idaho Fish and Game Conservation Information Supervisor after 17 years of dedicated service.

#### **Steelhead Junction**

My dad, Ted Trueblood (1913-1982) loved to write about the outdoors almost as much as he loved the outdoors itself. Raised on a family farm in the southwestern corner of Idaho, He made a living by writing and taking pictures of the things he liked to do best - hunting, fishing, camping, and cooking in the great outdoors.

He was a key player in the citizen ballot initiative to establish the Idaho Fish and Game Commission in 1938. In 1940 he worked for the Idaho Fish and Game Department as a conservation officer, field researcher, and public relations officer. By the 1960s he was a well-respected outdoor writer with a national following. Using his monthly column at *Field & Stream* and articles in other outdoor magazines he supported the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act, the Wilderness Act of 1964 and other legislation to protect natural resources. He was president of the River of No Return Wilderness Council, the citizens' group supporting wilderness designation for central Idaho, and the leader of Save Our Public Lands, the grassroots opposition to the sagebrush rebellion.

In 1963 he made the film "Steelhead Junction" with his friend C. W. "Doc" Jones, an Evinrude distributor. In 2009 a fellow retiree asked me about the movie and it set me on a long search. It took a while, but finally Fish and Game retiree and Archive Curator Mick Hoover located a copy owned by fishing guide Jeff Klassen. He was kind enough to donate the film to Boise State University, and long story short, it is now available online and is included in the Ted Trueblood Collection. I hope you enjoy! ~ Jack Trueblood
